Course Description

In this course we will learn how to read and interpret media artifacts through a variety of theoretical lenses. Our analysis will be anchored in both the form and content of a text and will take a critical approach to understanding embedded meanings, motivations, and representations in media. This course will primarily focus on screen-based media from the 20th century, including film, television, and advertising. Course readings will offer important concepts and vocabulary for analyzing media, but will be useful for understanding works of art and other cultural artifacts. (Prerequisites: ENGL 1102)

Course Objectives

After taking this course, successful students will have an advanced understanding of media studies and will have developed the following skills:

- A broad understanding of the historical development and cultural impact of various media.
- A set of theoretical tools for analyzing media texts critically.
- A diverse vocabulary of formal and cultural elements of screen-based media texts and other cultural artifacts.
- The ability to communicate analysis clearly and concretely through both written and oral communication.
- · How to find and use scholarly research through GT library resources.
- Respectful, thoughtful, and professional group discussion and collaboration.

Participation

Class participation is **mandatory**—please note that your in-class participation makes **almost half of your total grade**. You will be successful in this class if you show up and meaningfully contribute to group discussion having done all the readings before class.

I expect each of you to come to each class prepared to discuss course material. Participation in class discussion is important because it allows you to explore the class readings and concepts with your peers and, in the process, discover meanings and issues that you would not discover on your own. In-class participation challenges you to continuously question, refine, and articulate your own ideas and interpretations. Please note I do not expect each of you to have fully formed and nuanced understandings of each assigned reading, but I do expect you to engage with each reading to the best of your abilities (e.g. asking questions, applying concepts to your own experiences, thinking of relevant examples, etc.).

Attendance

I will not take attendance, but keep in mind that it is difficult to participate in class discussion if you are not present. If you know you will have personal conflicts or scheduling issues that will interfere with any deadlines, please email me *ahead of time* so we can discuss alternate arrangements.

Technology Policy
